Improving the Quality of Health Care

Improving the Quality of Health Care for the Residents of Southwest Saskatchewan

2005 was a busy year for the Foundation. Most of our time and energy was directed toward the launch of THE CAMPAIGN. Thus, new equipment purchases for the 17 acute and long-term facilities were limited. However, many of pieces of equipment purchased in 2004 were installed and/or became operational in 2005.

The Hematology Analyzer in Leader was one such purchase. Ricki Fauth, Acute Health Services Manager in Leader states, "This piece of equipment has increased the turn around time for hematology as it is much faster than the older analyzer." Quicker turn around times mean faster diagnosis and earlier treatment for patients. Ms. Fauth continues, "It also has several features which the older one did not have such as cap piercing which means that it is much safer for the staff since we do not have to remove the cap before analyzing the blood. This of course reduces the risk of diseases that could be transmitted through blood to the staff."

The defibrillator purchased for Shaunavon Ambulance last year is another. Darren Larrivee, Manager of Emergency Medical Services - Training expressed his thoughts on this purchase. "I would like to take this opportunity to thank

everyone involved in the purchase of our defibrillator. It has been used a number of times for the ECG function. Thankfully, we have not had to use the defibrillation option very often. However, the presence of this piece of equipment has enhanced the service we are able to provide to the community."

Perhaps the most exciting purchase made last year was the upgrade to the Dialysis unit with the addition of two new chairs. The Foundation applied to the Kinsmen Foundation for the \$60,247.27 required to purchase the chairs. This addition will increase the number of treatments from 1100 to 1800. Initially, the dialysis expansion was slated to occur at the new Cypress Regional Hospital but when the need for expanded services became critical a way was sought for such an expansion to occur immediately. The benefits of this expansion for residents in Southwest Saskatchewan who require dialysis was immediate. Many patients on the waiting list had to travel to Regina or Saskatoon to receive treatments, sometimes 2 - 3 times per week. With the addition of 2 more chairs, the number of patients who are required to travel was immediately reduced.

The Skills Enrichment Scholarship Program was created in 2002 and awards up to \$45,000.00 in scholarships annually. Funded by the Lee/Irwin Endowment and Dr. Moola Award, the scholarships provide funding assistance to front line employees of the Cypress Health Region and affiliates who wish to upgrade skills and further their education thereby improving the quality of health care for the residents of Southwest Saskatchewan.

In November 2005, the Bolding Family established an award for the continuing education of a Cypress Health Region nursing applicant in memory of Jeffrey Bolding. In December 2005, the Skills Enrichment Scholarship committee announced the recipient as Katherine Taylor of Consul.

An Investment in Quality of Care

In June of 2004, the Foundation encouraged a partnership with the Cypress Health Region to support the continuing education of Dr. Suryvanshi, a surgeon employed at the Cypress Regional Hospital. Over the last year, Dr. Suryvanshi has been working hard toward completing his studies and preparing for his final exams which will be written in the summer of 2006. Once completed, he will be returning to Swift Current to fulfill his commitment of two years.

A Strong Beginning...

After months of quietly obtaining commitments from many different sectors in Southwest Saskatchewan, the Foundation announced their most ambitious fundraising project yet, "THE CAMPAIGN ~ Toward Healthcare Excellence" to raise 7.5 million dollars primarily to equip and furnish the new Cypress Regional Hospital. At the media launch of the public portion of THE CAMPAIGN on September 12th, 2005, it was revealed that over 75% of the total required had already been raised. Donations from Ted Hanlon for \$1,000,000.00; the Swift Current Greek Orthodox Community and participating Credit Unions of Southwest Saskatchewan at \$250,000.00 each set the stage for a strong beginning to THE CAMPAIGN.

Support Flows In...

Soon support began to flow in. We launched the 52 weeks of fundraising program where businesses or organizations held events on our behalf and donated a portion of the proceeds to THE CAMPAIGN. Businesses such as Mom's Korner, Gramma Bep's, Dooly's, Pick-A-Deli and Kokopelli's and organizations like the Swift Current Hospital Auxiliary and the Royal Canadian Legion Poppy Committee stepped up to the challenge and showed their support for THE CAMPAIGN.

In October, the Foundation hosted the "Believe in Miracles" telethon featuring over 30 regional performers. Broadcast live on Shaw Cable 10, the 8-hour telethon raised \$210,666.51!

October also saw the launch of THE CAMPAIGN lottery co-ordinated by the Pioneer Co-op in celebration of their 25th Anniversary at the Wheatland Mall. Featuring over \$40,000 in Prizes to be won including the Grand Prize, a 1975 Red Corvette Coupe, the lottery attracted the support of thousands of ticket purchasers. The Grand Prize draw was held December 30, 2005. However, all of Southwest Saskatchewan were winners because the funds raised, \$60,000.00, were committed to equipping and furnishing the new regional hospital.

October concluded with the 7th Annual Night Out in Greece. Once again, the sold out crowd was treated to the high caliber of food and entertainment that attendees have come to expect. The Swift Current Greek Orthodox Community raised \$50,000.00 toward their commitment in support of the Cardiac Unit in the new Cypress Regional Hospital.

Financial Report

Auditor's Report

To the Board of Directors
Of the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation Inc.

We have examined the balance sheet of the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation Inc. as at December 31, 2005 and the statements of operations and changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Foundation board. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many charitable organizations, the Foundation derives revenue from donations and fund-raising conducted by itself and other organizations, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Foundation and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fund-raising revenues, surplus for the year, assets and fund balances.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the fund-raising referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Foundation as at December 31, 2005 and the results of its operations and the changes in cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
December 31, 2005**

1. Operations

The purpose of the Foundation is to raise, administer and disburse funds to improve the quality of health care for the people of Southwest Saskatchewan. The Foundation was incorporated under the Non-profit Corporation Act of Saskatchewan on October 31, 1998.

2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The more significant accounting policies are as follows:

(a) Fund accounting

The accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. For financial reporting purposes, accounts with similar characteristics have been combined into the following major funding groups

i) Operating fund

The operating fund reflects the revenue and expenses related to achieving the mission of the Foundation including administrative expenses, unrestricted donations, and unrestricted contributions.

ii) Restricted fund

The restricted fund reflects revenues that are designated for specific purposes by the contributor and the related expenses.

iii) Endowment fund

The endowment fund reflects permanent contributions. The income on the endowment fund is recorded in the restricted fund and is to be used for restricted purposes.

(b) Revenue recognition

The Foundation follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions as follows: Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund in the period it is received or receivable. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

(c) Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

(d) Investments

Investments are valued at the lower of cost and market value, unless the decline in market value is deemed temporary in nature by management.

(e) Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost and are amortized on a declining basis as follows:

(f) Contributed services and goods

The operations of the Foundation utilize services of many volunteers. Since these services are not normally purchased, and because of the difficulty in determining the fair market value of donated services, the value of these donated services is not recognized in the financial statements. Also, due to the difficulty in determining the fair market value of all donated goods, these goods have not been recognized in the financial statements.

(g) Income taxes

The Foundation is a registered charity within the meaning of the Income Tax Act and is; therefore, exempt from income taxes under Section 149(1) of the Act.

3. Inventory

Inventory is comprised of fundraising supplies, communication supplies and office supplies.

4. Pledges receivable

Pledges receivable relate to the capital campaign for the new regional hospital and are comprised as follows:

9. Financial Instruments

(a) Significant terms and conditions

There are no significant terms and conditions related to financial instruments classified as current assets or current liabilities that may affect the amount timing and certainty of future cash flows. Significant terms and conditions for the other financial instruments are disclosed separately in these financial statements.

(b) Fair value

The following methods and assumptions were used to estimate the fair value of each class of financial instrument:

•The carrying amounts of these financial instruments approximate fair value due to their immediate or short-term nature.

- o Cash and short term investments
- o Accounts receivable
- o Accounts payable

•For investments, the fair value is considered to approximate quoted market values.

10. Reclassification of prior year figures

Certain of the prior year figures provided for the purposes of comparison have been reclassified in order to conform to the current year presentation.

11. Commitments

The Foundation has committed approximately \$1.66 million to fund projected capital cost over-runs on the new regional hospital.

The Foundation has committed 6.1 million to fund equipment and furnishings for the new regional hospital. The commitments are to be funded from externally restricted funds as disclosed in Note 7.
